### President's Message

It is hard to believe that I started last year's newsletter with the following state-

ment: "COVID-19 has totally redefined the operations of your library and Friends of the Library (FOL) programming." While much has changed since then, much is still the same. The U.S. is facing a wave of the COVID Delta variant; and although the library is remaining open, the library has reinstated a mask mandate. We resumed monthly book sales in March 2021 a full year after we stopped sales. During this interim the FOL was unable to raise revenues, but because we had built up a rainy day fund, we were able to meet our semiannual library donations of \$12,500 in spring 2020, fall 2020, and spring 2021.

Their duties will begin in October with the new year. On behalf of the board, let me offer a special thanks to this slate of officers.

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

### **Books and Authors Programs**

When our last newsletter was published in September 2020, we were faced with a pandemic and the closing of many local businesses, including the library. At that time, we reported that we did not know if or when we would be able to resume the Books and Authors talks by published authors. Together we brainstormed and decided that we would attempt to continue the talks via the Zoom virtual format. With that in mind, we were able to schedule outstanding authors willing to make talks from their homes. The format actually enabled us to host several outstanding authors from remote locations, many of whom could not have traveled to Starkville to speak face to face.

Our Books and Authors series began in November with **Steve Robertson**, local author, journalist, and blogger, who has written several nonfiction books related to Mississippi State athletics (*Flim Flam*, *Stark Vegas*, *Alpha Dawgs*). He shared a



delightful and informative interview with
Starkville Public Library Director Phillip Carter.

In December, Jacksonian Miranda James (aka

Dean James) discussed his popular cozy mystery series (Cat Me if You Can, The Pawful Truth).



In January, Michael Farris Smith discussed his best-selling novels (Nick, Rivers, The Fighter, Desperation Road, Blackwood), three of which are being made into films.



February's speaker, **Margaret McMullan**, a resident of the Mississippi Gulf Coast, made a very

interesting presentation with slides detailing events from her memoir Where the Angels Lived: One Family's Story of Exile, Loss, and Return. Winner of the Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters 2020




award for nonfiction, the work describes her quest to learn about her relative who died in the Holocaust.

Another Mississippi Gulf Coast resident, Johnnie

Bernhard, spoke to the Zoom audience in March about her award-winning novels (A Good Girl, How We Came to Be, Sisters of the Undertow).



We concluded the speakers' series with Tupelo native and Albuquerque, NM, resident Minrose Gwin, a relative of the Gwins of Starkville. Her novel *The Accidentals* won the 2020 award for fiction given by the Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters. Her previous novels, *The Queen of Palmyra* and *Pramise*, have been nopular

### **Books and Authors Programs Coming Soon**

As fall 2021 approaches, we are, unfortunately, in a similar position as last fall. We originally planned to offer in-person speakers again, but the rampant spread of the COVID-19 Delta Variant has caused concern for indoor activities. In all likelihood, we will once again use the Zoom format for the Books and Author presentations. We will keep you updated through emails and social media about these plans. Presentation time has been changed to **6 p.m.** rather than noon. The good news outstanding authors representing a variety of genres are scheduled to speak this fall.



Catherine Pierce, who has just been named Poet Laureate for Mississippi, will kick off the series September 9. She was the recipient of the 2021 Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters poetry award for her latest book of poetry *Danger Days*. She also wrote the award-winning poetry books *The Tornado Is the World, The Girls of Peculiar, and Famous Last Words*.

**Susan Cushman**, who, incidentally, was our last in-person speaker in March 2020, will discuss her latest novel *John and Mary* October 14. Her previous works include *The Cherry Bomb* and *Friends of the Library*.



To conclude the fall lineup on November

9 we will host **Becky Hagenston**, an English professor at Mississippi



State, who has published three award-winning story collections: Scavengers, Strange Weather, and A Gram of Mars. Her latest collection, The Age of Discovery and Other Stories, was launched in August 2021.

We are very excited about our lineup of authors for the Books

and Authors series this fall and hope that you can join us for the presentations. Please note the new time of **6 p.m**. We will make every effort to keep you informed about upcoming events and the format that will be used.

### **Book Sales and Donations**

You might have thought that during the pandemic the donation of books ceased to be an active occurrence, but it was not so! Although the library remained open during certain days and just for curbside delivery, boxes of donated books continued to find their way to the back door of the library awaiting entrance on a nearly daily basis. FOL board members continued to work in groups of two or three several times a week separating, dating, and shelving recent acquisitions. Our two free tables quickly became overloaded, and so, this led to a wonderful addition on the library's front porch where three folding tables were set up to handle all our "new-old" books that did not fit the copyright dates for the sale room or the anytime sale room.

Throughout the pandemic, many people visited the free tables to take numerous books home to enjoy. Some even came with boxes ready to fill! This proved to be a wonderful way to serve our community when so many people were desperate for something different to read.

Now that the book sales have restarted, and the library is open for entry, our free tables have reverted to the two display areas near our sale rooms. Books are for sale in the anytime room for fifty cents each whenever the library is open. This room contains books whose copyright dates span from 2006–2011. You will find reference books, classics, cookbooks and hobbies, nonfiction and fiction, homeschool materials, and books for children and youth.

Our book sale room is only open during the monthly Monday book sale held the first Monday of the month from 12–6 p.m., except on holidays. Then the book sale will be held on the second Monday of the month. Please consider visiting our book sales. Book prices range from fifty cents to three dollars. We think this is the best deal in town!

Also, consider contributing your newer books that are in clean usable condition. You can receive a record of donated books for tax purposes. Our book sale proceeds are used to buy books for the library or to fund special programs. Also, remember, as you get ready to donate books, please purge any books that are not in good, saleable condition, and remember, please, no textbooks. We deeply appreciate the contributions our generous patrons continue to provide. You are helping make our library a great place to be!

### Grants Provide Needed Library Support

For over a year during the worst months of the pandemic, the FOL was unable to hold the monthly book sales that contribute the bulk of the funds FOL donates to the library in support of its programs. But because of the generosity of a number of community groups and individual donors, FOL was able to maintain a consistent level of support to the library during the past difficult year without sales.

FOL greatly appreciates the support of the Starkville Woman's Club that has been a faithful donor through the years. Grant money from Walmart has also been received in the past and, hopefully, another application request will be received favorably.

A consistent donor to FOL for a number of substantial special projects is 4-County Electric. Grant money from 4-County has made possible the replacement of obsolete library computers and, most recently, funding the purchase of additional shelving units for the library. If you have not been to the library in the last four months, come and see the new look of the collections.

Another important grant provided during the last six months was a significant grant from Starkville Utilities (SU) which designated pandemic funds made available to them from TVA to be distributed to entities serving the Starkville community. We owe a special thanks to Eileen Hall (SU) and Josh Wooten (TVA) who assisted FOL in the application process. The grant has been used to buy equipment for creating podcasts. An area has been designated in the library to provide the public access to the equipment and to present workshops that will aid in podcast and video production.

Another significant benefactor has been Modern Woodmen of America. We especially thank Barbara Coats and all of the local representatives for their willingness to support various library programs with grants to FOL. In addition to providing grant money, members of this group are frequent customers at our monthly sales. We are grateful for their unstinting support.

Last, but not least, FOL appreciates the many individual patrons who recognize the importance of the library in our community and continue to contribute to our efforts to promote and support the library's many programs.

### Book of the Week—New This Year

The "Book of the Week" book reviews were launched because of the need to provide fresh and meaningful content for the FOL social media presence. The publicity committee came upon the idea of posting a book review each week written by one of the FOL Board members. If you have met any of the FOL Board members, you realize quickly how easy it is for them to recommend an excellent book they are currently reading or have read recently. Often during the monthly book sale, FOL members are asked by shoppers to recommend a book. The "Book of the Week" seemed a great opportunity for the Board to do just that.

Having recommended the idea, Sue Minchew wrote the first book review of *Before We Were Yours* by Lisa Wingate on October 28, 2020. Since that initial post, FOL has posted 42 additional weekly reviews by 14 FOL Board Members, one by Phillip Carter, the director of the Starkville Public Library, and one by Nancy Hargrove, William L. Giles Distinguished MSU Professor Emerita and Starkville Library Discussion Leader. We owe a very special thanks to Maureen Lang for contributing 14 outstanding book reviews and Peggy Bates for writing 5 excellent reviews. They are both avid readers who read across a wide variety of genres.

To support the Books and Authors program that FOL was hosting via Zoom, book reviews were written on two of our Mississippi guest authors: Where the Angels Lived by Margaret McMullan and Promise and The Accidentals by Minrose Gwin. Additionally our own Bos Stevens included a book review on his three children's books, If You Went to the Zoo, If a Lonely Giraffe, and If You Met a Kind Fairy.

Of the popular book genres available to readers today, the FOL book reviews include books from the following genres: Suspense and thrillers, detective and mystery, fantasy, historical fiction, literary fiction, romance, biographies and autobiographies, memoirs, children, and cookbooks. This wide variety of genres is actually quite amazing as the board

members were open to writing on the books they enjoy. The responses from our Facebook views ranged from a high of 814 viewers on one post and a high of 143 engagements (likes, comments, shares, post clicks). The comments were often "That was an excellent read, and I learned a lot." Another viewer question, "Is there a book club I can join?" showed active results.

As you can imagine, this project was a major undertaking and commitment of the FOL Board. Yet each week another exciting book review was available for social media readers. 
### Before We Were Yours by Lisa Wingate Book Review by Sue Minchew


Members of the Friends of the Library Board have decided to begin a Book of the Week series with board mem-

bers reviewing some of their favorites. I have always loved books, but they have really sustained and entertained me during this pandemic. Thus, I was happy to write about one of my favorite recent reads.


Before We Were Yours by Lisa Wingate is a book that grabbed me and would not let go, and it has stayed with me long after I finished reading it. The novel is based on a true-life scandal involving the Tennessee Children's Home Society Orphanage in Memphis run by Georgia Tann, who appears as herself in the book. Tann and her minions, with the support of police and politicians, actually abducted indigent children from their parents, placed them in the orphanage (in horrendous conditions), and sold them to wealthy parents.

Wingate utilizes two narrators and two different time frames, alternating between Avery Stafford in present day Aiken, South Carolina, and Rill Foss, a 12-year-old girl living on a shanty boat on the Mississippi River in 1939. When the novel opens, Avery, a successful prosecutor in Maryland, has come home





The novel was one of the most engrossing that I have ever read. It was also one of the most shocking as I learned about the scandalous practice by the Tennessee Children's Home Society in Memphis of literally trafficking children, kidnapping and selling children for adoption.



### FOL Contributes to *Arts & Eats* Cookbook

Arts & Eats, the new coffee table cookbook produced by the Starkville Area Arts Council, will soon be available! This beautiful book will feature art, photographs, and stories about Starkville, as well as wonderful recipes curated by a committee of talented cooks. ### Notes from Phillip Carter, Library Director

My first year and a half in Starkville was anything but what I expected. When I moved here and assumed the role of director for the Starkville-Oktibbeha County Public Library System, I had no way of knowing what was coming. The pandemic has forced us to pivot and adapt on an almost daily basis. Coming up with creative and safe ways to engage and serve our patrons has been a continual challenge, and I'm proud of the work we have done to meet those needs, even if in a less than ideal situation.

Our children's librarian Loraine adapted story times for videos on Facebook that drew an international audience as she daily told a story accompanied by one of her many furry friends from farms and homes here in the Golden Triangle. Our Young Adult Librarian Rachel moved programming to Discord, a text and voice chat application. She also engaged our teens through text message groups and Zoom meetings.

We haven't neglected our adult readers either. During the pandemic while the library was closed to walk-ins, we provided curbside service, allowing patrons to simply call and request books that a staff member would deliver curbside. Finding other ways to keep our adult readers engaged, we've had drivethru trick-or-treating, adult book bingo, and Talk Like a Pirate grab bags, in addition to the thousands of books checked out and enjoyed by our patrons in the last year. We are proud of the accomplishments we have made thus far, but I genuinely feel that we're just beginning to create the impact I believe we can make.

We have begun redesigning the space inside the library to better serve our in-person patrons and are looking forward to completing those changes in the coming months. By moving some of the furniture and shelving to other locations, the area near the circulation desk is now more accessible and inviting. Computer stations have been relocated, freeing up the space at the front entrance, and bookshelves have been moved to the west end of the main floor

with shorter aisles, making it easier to locate books. Now placed at a right angle to the reading area, the shelves contain end caps that make the entire area more attractive. Plans are underway to convert the room now used as the law library to a space for the Young Adults.

In the coming months we're working to build partnerships with groups like Starkville Strong, Casserole Kitchen, the Discovery Center, the Starkville Area Arts Council, and others to create opportunities to serve the people of Starkville and Oktibbeha County in new and much needed ways. By providing small community job fairs, conducting résumé writing workshops, and hosting basic computer skills classes, the library can help meet the needs of our diverse population.

We are extremely grateful that the City of Starkville and Oktibbeha County have seen the work we're doing and are being incredibly supportive. Their continued social and economic support is very important for us to make the changes needed to maintain the library as a community hub and information center for everyone. While we continue to deal with the challenges of COVID-19, I am still hopeful for the future of library service in Starkville and Oktibbeha County and can't wait to share more of what we're doing with everyone. ### Children's Programming

When meeting Loraine Walker, the award-winning children's librarian at the

Starkville Public Library (SPL), it is immediately apparent that she is a force of nature. Also known as Miss Rainey to children, not just in Starkville, but followed all over the world, she can hardly contain her enthusiasm and pride in the record-breaking response to the programs she offers. It is her mission to light a fire of possibility and interest in the minds of children in the fields of literature and arts, culture and science, and the nature she so loves.

Loraine celebrated the most successful sum-

mer reading program to date. There were nearly 6,000 attendees at the library for the onsite Monday through Thursday programs offered in June and July. The ranks were swelled by the regular inclusion of the local Boys and Girls Club. These sessions ran the gamut from science, technology, and arts and crafts to the ever-popular Miss Rainey's Storytime. Loraine praised the dedicated participation of Mississippi State University, local businesses, and artists who gave their time and talents to spark the interests of the children in attendance. She could see it in the face of the boy who imagined that digging in the dirt, an activity led by the Cobb Institute of Archeology, is not just fun, but also exciting and important, or in the sparkle of interest when the little girl realized that she could study the stars and go into space, as described by

MSU's Rocket Team, the Space Cowboys.

In the area of arts and crafts, Loraine is earnestly thankful for the local businesses and artists who stepped up to provide projects on Art STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math) days in the wake of cancellations by performers and enter-

tainers due to COVID-19 restrictions. Children made bath bombs with Magnolia Soap, dyed T-shirts with Hi Y'all! Made in the South, and 3-D printed bubble wands with MSU's Idea Shop. The Starkville Area Arts Council, Chick-Fil-A, Dunkington Arts and Jewelry, The Flower Company, and Jilly Bean's Pail of Paints also provided exciting activities. The season finale was a surprise visit from the Mississippi Aquarium, which brought a display of artifacts and living reptiles that are native inhabitants of our state.

Reading remained the major focus with children logging over 2,200 reading hours! For each hour read, Game Stop awarded a prize to the reader. The Kids Need to Read program donated over 500 new books to the SPL, including a new book to each child participating in the summer library Storytime.

### Youth Adult Programming

The Starkville Pubic Library is more than a place with a lot of books. It is also a place that offers activities for adults, children, and the youth of the community. Leading the young adult (YA) activities for almost three years is Rachel Watson. The very successful summer YA reading session, led by Rachel, included activities such as an Anime club. Summer readers earned scratch-off tickets with a chance to win prizes.

Rachel, who is an MSMS and MSU graduate, is looking forward to even more activities that appeal to teens who join the group. Rachel brings enthusiasm and a joy in working with the thirteen and up youth along with creativity in her program planning.

During the upcoming fall program, youth can look forward to a new meeting place in the library which is more spacious and which will allow the youth to make use of the new equipment provided by FOL as a result of a grant from Starkville Electric/TVA. Teens can learn how to create their own video and audio podcasts and share their creative efforts with one another.

As the new session begins, activities have been planned that take into consideration current health protocols. To-Go bags will be available every other week, and there will be passive programs for the youth—things they can do on their own time in the library with little instruction needed. These activities will change every other week. Teens are encouraged to come to the Starkville Library and join in fun with the YA programming.
