Grants and Donations Provide Library Support

FOL is committed to supporting not only the many ongoing programs of the Starkville Pubic Library, but also to providing needed equipment and additional library materials. The primary source of our fundraising is the monthly book sale held in the FOL sale room downstairs at the library on the first Monday of each month. We are thankful for the many generous donations of books as well as all those who attend our sales. Many loyal supporters attend each sale. In addition, in the past year we have been able to expand our presence on the main floor of the library. New shelves against the wall are loaded with a large selection of books that can be purchased at the front desk anytime the library is open.

Another very important component of our fundraising efforts is the financial support we receive through grants from local organizations and businesses. In the past year we received funds from a number of generous grants. Modern Woodmen again provided a \$1,000 matching grant given to FOL in support of the library's popular summer reading program. Adding to support for this program was a grant for \$2,000 from the Starkville Rotary Club, and a grant of \$500 came from the Walmart Marketplace. The summer reading program serves all the children in Oktibbeha County with programs scheduled at all of the library branches. Special guest speakers and competition prizes make the summer program a favorite for schoolchildren in the area.

4-County Electric funded FOL with a grant of over \$5,000 that has been used to make needed improvements in the library facilities. Visit the library to see the recent updates.

We look forward to working with these and other organizations and businesses in the coming year.

Successful Books and Authors Programs

The FOL Books and Authors program offered outstanding authors representing a variety of genres. Our fall lineup consisted of a poet, a novelist, and a short story writer. In the spring, we had a nonfiction author, a literary discussion, and concluded with a poet during the National Poetry Month in April. We transitioned to in-person talks in November. In January, we returned to noon presentations, and that time slot will be continued for the 2022–23 season.

Mississippi Poet Laureate Catherine Pierce was

the September speaker. A resident of Starkville and an English professor at Mississippi State, Pierce has won several awards for her fascinating books of poetry. She discussed her latest collection *Danger Days*. She has also written *The Tornado Is the World*,



The Girls of Peculiar, and Famous Last Words.

In October, **Susan Cushman** spoke with us from Memphis via Zoom about her latest novel, *John and Mary*. Combining personal anecdotes with her discussion of the book, Cushman gave a compelling

presentation that challenged us to re-examine some of our own attitudes related to race. Her previous works include *The Cherry Bomb* and *Friends of the Library*.



The fall lineup concluded in November with MSU English Professor **Becky Hagenston**, who has published three award-winning story collections: *Scav*-

engers, Strange Weather, and A Gram of Mars. Hagenston discussed her recent publication, The Age of Discovery, a book of short stories that covers a wide variety of thought-provoking topics.



We continued with in-

person talks in the spring and were very excited in February to host **Steve Robertson**, who discussed his book about the MSU baseball team's magical

2021 season that culminated in wining the College World Series. Robertson, who covers MSU sports for Gene's Page and hosts a blog, gave a very thorough and informative talk about the 2021 baseball season to a large crowd of MSU fans. The



attendees were excited to purchase signed copies of *Dawg Pile*, his recently published book, which chronicles the entire season and includes many color photos. It's a definite keepsake for MSU fans.

In March, as a preamble to the Library's April Grape Gatsby Gala, MSU Giles Distinguished Professor Emerita **Nancy Hargrove** provided an insightful literary discussion of F. Scott Fitzgerald's classic novel *The Great Gatsby*. Her well-attended talk drew many devoted fans from her literary discussions held at Starkville Public Library. She discussed details about Fitzgerald's life reflected in the novel, as well as comments about the time period and the motifs and symbolism in the novel.

In April, during the National Poetry Month, **Laurie Parker** spoke about her latest publication, a book of poetry entitled *Fistfuls of Starlight*. The audience was thoroughly entertained by Parker's nostalgic and amusing poems, which are both relatable and lots of fun. A special treat was provided by Billie Lane Hood, Parker's senior English teacher, who introduced her and shared some of the poems and cards Parker created in high school.



tery. His book has been described as "what do you get when an accounting professor with a passion for fraud prevention and detection writes a novel about baseball and money? The Anderson Conspiracy."

Candace Cox Wheeler will present her second novel,

Squall in the Gulf, on October 13. Set in the 1920s, this thriller has a cast of characters from flappers to gangsters, from rum running to jazz and is set in Chicago, New Orleans, and the Mississippi Gulf Coast. A native of Biloxi and lawyer by trade, her highly-regarded first novel, Cradle in the Oak, also a period piece



set in 1906, was based on a fascinating true story of a woman's determination to find her missing children.



FOL Contributes to Arts & Eats Cookbook



Arts & Eats: Art, Food & Culture in Starkville, is the Starkville Area Arts Council (SAAC)'s beautiful new cookbook which celebrates the organization's 25th anniversary, as well as all things Starkville. The cookbook, which came out in March 2022, is now available from the SAAC for \$35. It can be ordered on the organization's website at <u>starkvillearts.net</u>. Patrons may also purchase one at the agency's new office located on 122 East Main Street .

This lavishly illustrated book is 224 pages of recipes, stories, pictures, and illustrations. Various sections feature recipes from traditional divisions, such as Soups and Salads, and newer categories of interest, such as

Vegetarian and Vegan Entrees. Each recipe was tested by committee members before its inclusion in the book. Additionally, wonderful stories about Starkville are interspersed into the chapters. Examples include "For Whom the Cowbells Toll" and "Before the Show Goes On." Other stories feature local icons such as Dan Camp and Carol McReynolds Davis with many other interesting pictures, illustrations, and stories about Starkville life, people, and places. The content of recipes, stories, pictures, and illustrations makes this a "must have" for anyone with ties to Starkville or Mississippi State University.

This book was made possible through individual contributions and business support. The proceeds from this book will be used to support the arts in Starkville, including the work of the FOL.

Patty Roper, *Mississippi Magazine*'s editorial director, writes in the foreword as follows: "This book is all that we hold dear about Mississippi and her stories. Along with great recipes, it embodies our love of community and hospitality, our cherished Southern heritage . . . " (p. 6).

News from Phillip Carter, Library Director

Speaking at the grand reopening of the downtown public library in Charleston, West Virginia, a keynote speaker stated that "[libraries] are no longer warehouses of books. They are marketplaces of ideas. They are a community's living room." This is why I made the decision to begin working in public libraries. I believe that libraries are more than the books that we house and that they are instead places of education, entertainment, and air conditioning to escape the oppressive Mississippi heat.

Over the last year the staff and I have worked to increase the number of programs offered, the number of partnerships, and even the number and variety of materials we carry to better serve all of Starkville and Oktibbeha County. From our Summer Reading Program that saw over 682 kids register for summertime activities and reading (over 240,000 minutes read as of the writing of this article!), to our adult program activities that included plant exchanges, book clubs, and crafting groups, to our Grape Gatsby Fundraising Event held in April that brought over 120 people together in the Starkville Public Library for food, wine, and music, we have diversified the offerings of the public library to genuinely have something for everyone.

None of this has been without challenges—but they are challenges that have been met head on. With

increased support from the City of Starkville, Oktibbeha County, and the Friends of the Starkville Library we've been able to purchase more materials, increase staffing, and create new partnerships within our community to strengthen our citizens, and I'm so very proud of all that we have done and will continue to do.

The future is bright—we have new Wi-Fi infrastructure on the horizon as well as a new 16-seat computer lab complete with projection screen and sound system for workshops, lectures, and entertainment. We are using the funds raised from our Grape Gatsby fundraiser to upgrade our book drop behind the library and to decorate and stock our new Young Adult Room for new and exciting teen programming here at the Starkville Public Library. I am so proud of the work we accomplished in the last year and look forward to the work we will accomplish in the coming year with the support of our community, this amazing staff, and our Friends of the Starkville Library.

Children's Programming Is Huge Success



Summer reading at Starkville Public Library (SPL) got off to an auspicious start with over 1,000 people attending our kick-off event with the Tickled Pink Petting Zoo! Our second highest-turnout event was Dr. Wacky's Dinosaur Crew with 535 patrons inside the library. We were bursting at the seams with fun! Of course, none of these amazing programs would be possible without the support of the Friends of the Starkville Public Library.

Starting June 1 and going through July 31, we had an amazing summer reading program this year with an "Ocean of Possibilities"! We had a record-setting total of 682 reading participants in the children's summer reading program. When our end-of-summer reading treasure chest was finally empty, 247,860 minutes had been read this summer!


SPL had 40 programs attended by 4,301 patrons in June and July. In addition, our summer reading program set another record at SPL! Some of the programs were continuations of series, like our weekly art program funded by the Starkville Arts Council.

Other programs were animal and science performers, like our Harry Potter Night and Yarbrough's Educational Reptiles, that were new and very well-received. With our STEAM and LEGOs programs, the library was able to ensure that children throughout the community not only had the opportunity to participate in summer reading, but also the chance to strengthen their skills in science and technology. Additionally, Miss Rainey's Storytime featured a life-sized dancing shark to help lead the music, along with oceanthemed books and puppets.



Programs for Everyone

The library offers programming for children, teens, and adults. The graphic at the right illustrates games night for teens, plant exchange, gardening workshop, adult coloring club, and a common threads sewing day for adults. Confessions of an Audio Book Convert

An avid reader, I have always preferred physical books, favoring hardbacks with their colorful covers and informative flaps. But paperbacks have their own appeal. I can slip one in my purse to carry along on a trip or prop one up while walking on the treadmill. Often, I have scoffed at friends who extolled the virtues of audio books. Was that really reading? Was it cheating? I just knew it wasn't for me. Then disaster struck. I got COVID!

Along with it, I got a raging eye infection that prevented me from reading. In desperation, I turned to audio books. Stuck at home, I had to rely on my electronic devices. Fortunately, I already had installed the Library's **Libby App**, but I had seldom used it and, admittedly, had to call the library to obtain my PIN number. Once in, I found a treasure trove of books right at my fingertips, and, to my delight, many of them were audibles.

After browsing the fiction section, I decided on one of Michael Connelly's Bosch books, *Two Kinds of Truth*. Titus Welliver, the narrator, breathed life into Harry Bosch in ways my imagination never could. I began carrying Welliver's rich voice with me throughout the day as I applied makeup, did the laundry, or fixed lunch. Never before very good at multitasking, I had become a pro! Moreover, those menial daily tasks had become so much more enjoyable. As soon as I finished the book, I began scrolling Libby for another one. I liked Libby's

feature that allowed me to listen to a sample before borrowing the book. I found that I was most attracted to a really good narrator.

My eyes have recovered, but, believe it or not, I now actually prefer audio books! If you've never tried one, take it from me, a former physical book snob, it's worth a try! You might become a convert, too.
